## House of Lords Briefing by the Repeal Bill Alliance Day 2 Report Stage

Monday will see Day 2 of Report stage for the EU (Withdrawal) Bill and the all important votes on the Charter, maintenance of EU environmental principles and standards, and the thorny issue of the status of retained EU law.

As already stated in our <u>recently published briefing</u> to peers, we remain concerned about the lack of clarity around the legal status of EU retained law and have asked for an unambiguous definition of retained EU law. The recent government amendments have done little to address our concerns, and indeed feel that to some degree has added to more confusion<sup>1</sup>.

In previous correspondence with members of the Constitution Committee we requested peers to ask the following questions of the government to try for clarification:

- (1) What is the new hierarchy of law in the UK post-retention for the purposes of interpretation? i.e. what is the hierarchy of the categories of: primary legislation implementing EU law, SIs implementing EU law, "retained direct minor EU legislation", and "retained direct principal EU legislation"?
- **(2)** How can proposed paragraph 3E of Schedule 8 be reconciled with the retention of the principle of supremacy of EU law under clause 5?
- (3) Please explain the logic and effect of proposed paragraph 3C of Schedule 8.
- (4) The government's new clause effectively demotes the status of delegated legislation that provide employment and equality protections derived from EU law. Previously that legislation could only have been modified in a way that was compatible with the protections conferred by EU law. How does the government justify this effective demotion in light of the promises to preserve employment and equality protections?

In addition, we urge support for amendment 21 laid by Lords Pannick, Goldsmith, Wallace of Tankerness, Viscount Hailsham, which will provide clearer guidance for courts and tribunals on the role of EU case law after exit day.

We are also concerned that environmental standards and principles are vulnerable to becoming weaker under the current provisions in the bill and are recommend peers to support **Amendment 27**, laid by Baroness Brown of Cambridge, Baroness Jones of Whitchurch, Baroness Bakewell and Lord Deben which will maintain EU environmental principles and standards in the bill.

Finally, Monday will also see votes on the Charter. To protect rights and standards, it is vital that the Charter is included in the bill. We therefore encourage support for **Amendment 15** laid by Lord Pannick, Goldsmith, Baroness Ludford, Lord Deben to keep the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights in the bill.
